Specific dates and details of the opportunities listed in this brochure will be communicated to students directly.


We hope that students find plenty to be inspired by in this programme and make the most of the exciting opportunities on offer.

#### **Da Vinci Society**

#### **Dramatic Arts Careers**

Year 7 to 9 are invited to join KS3 Science Club, which will extend your knowledge, enrich your classroom learning, and also provide a lot of fun along the way. This is an excellent way to explore a range of scientific disciplines, ahead of potentially specialising later on in school.

#### **Landor Dining Society**

Our Sixth Form student-led Dining Society invites speakers with diverse specialisms and expertise. The visiting speaker addresses students after a three-course meal.

#### Lit & Phil Society

The Lit & Phil Society is for anyone interested in exploring ideas beyond the classroom. It meets every half term, with each session run by students or teaching staff.

#### Lit Soc

For all Sixth Formers and keen GCSE students who want to delve deeply into the world of literature, criticism and theory. The society looks at seminal authors, with a focus on combining enjoyment of reading with developing a thoughtful response to literature.

#### **Model United Nations**

MUN is a superb way for students to learn about international perspectives on topical issues, as well as to learn how to articulate their views in front of others.

#### **Multi-Media Journalism Club**

Pupils come to share ideas about things they care about, discuss topical issues, write articles about the things that matter to them, and create multi-media methods of communicating them to our school community, including podcasts.

#### **Procreate Club**

Working with the Procreate app, pupils will learn digital art techniques and how they can create new outcomes.

# Calendar of Events

#### Start of Term

#### Launch of KS3 Inspire Essay Competition

Pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 are invited to submit entries to the annual Inspire Essay Competition. Through this competition, students are invited to explore an area of their choosing, conduct thorough research into this area, generate their own essay title and then submit their essay. The competition is designed to promote intellectual curiosity and academic rigour. Full details will be provided to students in the launch assembly early in the Summer term.

#### **Dr McGale Competition**

Dr McGale was a former King's High Head of Biology and his family sponsor a Speech Day prize for a KS3 Biology project. This is the most prestigious Science prize you can win in KS3 at school. The competition is open to Year 9 students and involves creating a piece of display work on a chosen species.

## Imposter Syndrome: What is it and how does it affect women vs men?

A talk from the Literature and Philosophy Society (one of our Sixth Form-led societies) on the ethics and causes of imposter syndrome, including its impact on daily life and its differing effects on different genders.

#### Thursday 1st May

#### **Junior Physics Challenge**

The Junior Physics Challenge competition is designed to engage and challenge students of all abilities by offering them a range of problems to solve. The key aim is that students enjoy taking part and are encouraged to do more physics. They do not need to cover technical topics outside the syllabus, but they might be shown some pictures of famous physicists and asked to identify one (Hawking, Galileo or Newton for example).

#### Thursday 1st May

#### Junior Mathematical Challenge

The Junior Mathematical Challenge is taken by all students in Years 7 and 8, it is a 60-minute, 25 multiple choice Challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency to make students think. The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are accessible yet still challenge those with more experience.

#### Wednesday 7th May

#### 'The Good, The Bad, The Influenced'

The Café Philo society (one of our Sixth Form led societies) will be holding a discussion on the topic: 'The Good, The Bad, The Influenced'. Human nature, a concept so inerrant it could be overlooked? This discussion is a prime time to learn some philosophical views on human nature as well as share your own insights on the matter and it's welcome to all year groups!

#### Friday 9th May

#### **Medical Strategy Talks**

Talks for L6th students on medical and military strategy, as part of an interdisciplinary conference hosted at WSF.

#### Saturday 10th May

#### **Marie Curious**

This is a really fun event aimed at students in KS3 to inspire students to study Science at a higher level. The day runs with a series of hands on workshops that are based on the research work within Oxford Physics Department. This is followed by a question and answer session to meet the researchers and the day finishes with a Science Show in the Hall. It is usually a really fun day and the students benefit enormously from the experience.

#### Saturday 10th May

#### Drama, Spanish and French multilingual play -Art by Yasmina Reza

"Art" by Yasmina Reza is a witty, thought-provoking play about friendship, taste, and the nature of art. When Serge buys an expensive, all-white painting, his friends react with disbelief, leading to heated debates and deep-seated tensions.

## An insight into Foundation and Fine Art at Loughborough University

The Da Vinci Society are proud to welcome Freya Wright, Head of Fine Art pathway (Foundation Art & Design) at Loughborough University, who will provide valuable insight into the course. Freya will also show examples of artwork, provide portfolio and application advice and also discuss the importance of pursuing a creative career path. The talk is applicable for Year 10, 11, 12 and 13 but younger students are also welcome to attend if they are interested in studying Art at university.

#### **Biology Challenge**

A national Biology Challenge for Year 10 students. The competition consists of two multiple choice papers with questions both within the school curriculum but also rewarding those students whose biological knowledge has been increased by reading books and magazines, watching natural history programmes and taking notice of biology in the news.

#### Saturday 7th June

#### KS3 Inspire Trip - British Motor Museum

Our termly KS3 Inspire trip this term will be a fascinating visit to the British Motor Museum in which students will have the opportunity to engage in STEM-based workshops focusing on alternative fuel sources, designing salt-powered cars and trialling their engineering ideas on a Jaguar D-type remote control car. The visit promises to be hugely enriching for students and offers an opportunity to consider possible future careers in engineering and motoring industries.

#### **Rugby School Science Quiz**

An inter-school science quiz hosted at Rugby school. One team of 4 Lower Sixth students is invited to enter. Team selection will take place in May.

Café Scientifique (one of our Sixth Form-led societies) will be putting on a fun set of activities for KS3, following our theme for next term which is 'Order and Chaos'. #### **Biology Field Trip**

#### Year 9 In-House Internship Programme

Our annual In-House Internships programme will run again after the May half-term for students in Y9. Students apply to undertake an internship and then and, if their application is successful, complete it during the second half of the Summer Term.

The internships will enable students in Years 9 to gain invaluable experience working to develop evidence-based ideas and solutions to real-life problems 'in-house' at KHS and partake in 'real-life' analytical and problem-solving activities learning to collaborate, research, produce evidence-based ideas and solutions and develop their presentation skills. #### Year 8 Pompeii Project

Are you intrigued by life in Pompeii? Do you want to extend your knowledge of the society in the town of Pompeii, 2000 years ago? If so, the Pompeii Project offers pupils from Year 7 and Year 8 the opportunity to work on a project focusing on an aspect of Pompeian culture; you could choose dining and dinner parties or the gladiators; you could look into daily life in more detail and study the Roman bath houses in Pompeii or research into what happened during the day of the eruption of Vesuvius. How you want to present your project is entirely up to you; you could produce a poster or write an article for a 'Roman magazine'; you could build a model Pompeian villa or an amphitheatre; you could produce a menu for a Roman dinner party on an authentic looking scroll. 
