# HEAD MASTER'S INTRODUCTION

Summer Term is always a busy and joyful term of two halves. The first half of term works towards summer exams for all students, including public exams for GCSE and A Level pupils, whilst the second half of term is filled with special events, activities and trips. It has been a great pleasure to see the diligence and commitment of our King's High community in working hard towards exams and getting stuck into a range of exciting endeavours.

The creative and performing arts are thriving at King's High and there have been so many opportunities to celebrate this. In Music, we enjoyed a brilliant Key Stage 3 Concert which showcased the depth and breadth of musical talent in school, and this was followed by our Year 7 Concert in which each form, with everyone playing in the orchestra, demonstrated excellent progress and learning from their instrumental programme. Our Upper Sixth Leavers' Concert was very special and moving as we reflected on the final days in school of this year's leaving cohort. It has been exciting to see the rapid progress of chamber music at King's and we were thrilled this term to celebrate our new Year 7 group, Accordia, who progressed through local and regional stages to, eventually, be crowned, national U12 Chamber Music Champions in the Prestigious Pro Corda Competition at Drapers' Hall in London.

In Drama, the Junior Production of The Addams Family was a particular highlight, with a huge cast performing to packed audiences over three nights in the Bridge House Theatre. I was tremendously proud of students and staff – cast and crew – who took part in this spectacular production. As we go to press, our annual Art Exhibition is taking place within our Foundation Home Festival. It is part of Warwickshire Open Studios' Summer Art Weeks and everyone who attends is set to be stunned by the sheer quality and creative ingenuity of the students' work.

We have also enjoyed a superb summer of sport, culminating in lots of fun at Sports Day as the houses battled it out for honours. Our tennis teams have been on fire and it was a great pleasure to visit Nottingham Tennis Centre to see our U18 team finish 10th in the country in their national finals. Our Equestrian Team did incredibly well at their national finals at Hickstead, whilst our athletes shone at the ISA national finals at the Alexander Stadium.

The Festival of Wellbeing took place this year amidst glorious sunshine and was a wonderful occasion with so many activities. We were visited by three very popular alpacas and a helter-skelter went up, which, as Head, I felt obliged to test out!

We have seen tremendous success this term with the news that we were selected as national finalists in the TES Independent School of the Year Award and the Muddy Stiletto's Award for 'Giving Something Back', for our ambitious community work. We have also just been shortlisted for Independent Girls' School of the Year Award in the coveted Independent Schools of the Year Awards 2024.

It is impossible to give a full sense of the incredible range of student achievements and success at King's High, but I hope that you enjoy reading about the spirit of our school and I wish you a very happy summer holiday.

# THE EGGSTRONAUTS BLAST OFF

Our new Rocket Club launched this year under the expert guidance of George Tarver. Our team of Lower Sixth Physics students, 'The Eggstronauts', have been diligently researching, designing, and building the next generation of rockets in preparation for the UK Youth Rocketry Challenge (UKROC) 2024.

Make no mistake; these are not your average school rockets – no foot pumps or Alka-Seltzer involved. These rockets are much larger in scale, requiring a special launch site. After performing a swing test to check the aerodynamics and balance, our rocket soared to an altitude of approximately 600 feet, with the payload of an egg remaining undamaged, though some tweaks were needed.

Following adjustments, the team travelled to Chippenham for a special launch event of our custom-built rocket. This time, the rocket soared to an impressive altitude of 738 feet at a top speed of 172 mph! Crucially, the egg payload remained unscathed!

We were thrilled to announce that our team then qualified for the UKROC National Final on 27 June! UKROC engages young engineers with practical experience in executing complex missions. It's an exciting way to deepen their knowledge of maths and science, and the UK winners compete against teams from France, the USA, and Japan at the International Finals at the Farnborough Airshow in July.

At the UKROC National Final at Buckminster, The Eggstronauts achieved an impressive 9th place out of 20 teams in the final and over 230 teams in the entire competition. The rocket fired successfully and functioned properly, though it didn't quite reach the target height of the winning team.



## EARTH DAY







This year saw the first UK exhibition at the V&A dedicated to the work of French Couturière, Gabrielle 'Coco' Chanel.



It was from this exhibition that Izzy, one of our Design and Technology GCSE students became inspired to combine the elegance of Chanel with the real world problem of Climate Change and the devastating impact fast fashion has on our world. Izzy used 'Peace silk/Ahimsa silk' to create her garment. Unlike traditional silk production which involves boiling silkworms alive within their cocoons to obtain the silk fibres, Peace silk is made by allowing the silkworms to complete their metamorphosis into moths before harvesting their cocoons.

Ahimsa is a Sanskrit term that means 'non-violence' or 'non-harming' and it is this innovative, creative, forward thinking, problem solving and change making way

of designing that is taught to the students that choose Design and Technology Product Design at GCSE. The work this year has been inspired by many past designers such as Louis Comfort Tiffany, Mary Quant, William Morris and Vivienne Westwood and the students responded by Researching, Designing, Making and Evaluating the products they created in response to the Contextual Challenges this year of:

- Climate Change
- Playing games
- Securing or Storing personal possessions




*'Throughout the trip, we faced countless Costa Rican wildlife, such as talking parrots who responded back to us by saying 'hola', white-*

## HARWELL CAMPUS

Our Lower Sixth Physicists enjoyed a fascinating visit to the Harwell Campus Open Day in June. Harwell Campus and the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory are currently welcoming visitors to explore behind the scenes, and to see first-hand where some of the world's most pioneering research takes place.

It's home to a range of world-leading scientific facilities, including RAL Space, ISIS Neutron and Muon Source, Scientific Computing, Particle Physics, the Central Laser Facility and Diamond, the UK's national synchrotron light source.

King's students took part in a workshop delivered by RAL Space, learning how to code a space instrument designed for remote sensing (measuring CO<sub>2</sub> levels in the Earth's atmosphere) from orbit, and listened to experts who explained their inspirational work and how it will improve life for current and future generations.

to students aged 13-15. An additional 12 students received silver certificates and a further 24 students received bronze certificates. # KING'S DRAMA

## The Summer Term has been full of dramatic highlights at King's High.

Our dedicated Props Club students were responsible for many of the show's most memorable props, not to mention Mrs Carter-Howell's sensational handmade rocket pack. We even treated students and staff to an Addams-themed menu at lunchtime!

Our Drama Scholars and Ambassadors continued to inspire younger performers at both King's High and Warwick Prep. Several of our dedicated peer mentors headed to the Prep to support their Year 6 counterparts with their characterisation, projection, stage presence and physicality ready for their performance of 'Peter Pan

Jr'. As part of our preparations for the Festival from Home 24, the Young Directors project invited aspiring directors to develop and devise their own pieces of theatre, working with younger students. Sixth Form Drama Scholar Hope also took on the mammoth task of directing and musically directing 'Annie Jr.' for our Key Stage 3 Musical Theatre club, assisted by our student choreographer Lucy. The performance enabled younger students from King's High and Warwick School to take their showcase work to the next level through the challenge of an all-singing, all-dancing production. As part of the festival, several of our Scholars and Ambassadors took part in an exciting collaboration with Parkview Care Home: 'The Reminiscence Project'. Inspired by real life stories, the students developed a moving and imaginative piece of theatre alongside the residents.

The rest of our co-curricular Drama clubs entertained audiences with a pantomime showcase in April, complete with plenty of audience participation, glowing props and popcorn. The Friday Afternoon Improv troupe are all set to entertain audiences at Festival from Home 24 with another highly imaginative and fully improvised performance. The group also recently enjoyed an inspiring theatre



trip to Showstopper: An Improvised Musical. Meanwhile, our Aspiring Creatives in Theatre have been working on set and prop design alongside creating their own director's concepts. They have also designed their own 'Theatres of the Future', considering how venues can adapt to be inclusive for all. 

The U15 hardball team once again have been forging the way for cricket here at King's and defeated Stowe School comfortably in the first round of their National Cup.

The Summer Term has, of course, seen our skiing team in action, this time at the ISA Indoor event in Hemel Hempstead. Following on



from successes earlier in the year for the team, our U16 team skied superbly to take the silver medals on the podium on this occasion.

At the beginning of May it was Football that was dominating the sporting programme at King's. Both the U12 GSA and U13 ISFA Midlands Finals tournaments were hosted here and our teams certainly did not disappoint. The U12 team finished 3rd in the Cup out of 20 teams that attended and the U13 team took the overall title in their competition and now go on to represent the Region in the National Finals.

It has been a busy time for our athletes who have competed, and shone, in a range of different competitions. The afterschool club for students from Y5-13 has had fantastic numbers attend and it has been wonderful to see students learning from each other as well as pushing themselves as individuals. The Junior team finished in 1st place at the ESAA Track and Field Midlands B finals and the Inters team won their qualifying round to qualify for the A final. Competing at the ISA Regional Finals as individuals rather than a team, nine King's High students were successful in gaining a place to compete at the National Finals. This was backed up by superb performances in the Year 9 & 10 District Championships and County championships which has seen six athletes selected to represent the region at the Mason Trophy this summer. This is a record number for King's High.

Our equestrian riders have had tremendous success at every level this summer. A special mention must go to Eleanor and Tillie who finished in 1st and 2nd place respectively in their classes at Hickstead over the half term break. This was accompanied by Purdie who finished in 4th place in her event, just missing out on a podium place by 0.05 seconds. Our younger 70cm team, including some students from Warwick Prep, also enjoyed success on the day finishing in 15th place.

Finally, we are very proud to report that our U18 tennis team have had the most tremendous season this term. They started by defeating Bromsgrove in the third round of the Aberdare Cup, and

never looked back from this point. After a nail-biting match against Ellesmere College, winning 10-3 in a championship tie break, we are delighted to report that King's High will be playing at the National Championship Finals. This is a first time for the school and puts this team amongst the very best U18 tennis teams in the Country.

We hope that, despite the slightly damp weather conditions earlier this term, all students in the school have found enjoyment in their sport, whether that has been from the fun activities played as part of the curriculum and afterschool clubs, trying something new and achieving something they didn't believe they could in athletics training, or rising to the very top of their sport as some of our athletes, skiers, tennis players, footballers and horse riders have been able to do.

# A WORD FROM THE PRINCIPAL



As I write this, the General Election is still some days away, but I am mindful that the election result will be known when it is read.

For those of us who believe in the importance of a strong independent education sector, many of the headlines and commentaries around our schools have made uncomfortable reading, not least because of the stereotypical view of our schools, our pupils and families, and indeed our alumni. For all the 'loud failures' in the sector which may be seized on, there are many more 'silent successes'.

I believe strongly that our pupils – your children – are forces for good in society and that the education we provide can better equip them for the ever-changing and uncertain world they enter as adults.

We are unlikely to know what the policies around VAT and implementation of business rates are likely to be until the King's Speech later in July at the earliest. As with so many things in life, it is uncertainty which is hard to handle, and is unsettling for so many.

Anything which affects our schools - that may be government policies, economic recession, reputational challenges - has the potential to damage the impact our charity can have. I am mindful - and increasingly so - of the impact this charity has had over hundreds of years; the good we do both directly with the pupils we educate and indirectly through the impact we have on our local community.

Many may well consider our likely challenges a niche issue; the preoccupation of a tiny proportion of society, and a privileged proportion at that.

I disagree.

Independent schools are a healthy part of this nation's diverse educational ecosystem, providing different perspectives on educational issues, and driving initiatives which have impact on education beyond our individual school gates.

I know first-hand how transformational education can be. Growing up in a mining town in Derbyshire, my parents saw education as a way of enabling me to have more choices than they had had in my future life. A cost accountant and a nursing auxiliary, there was no spare money in the household; my schooling was determined by a hefty Music Scholarship and an equally hefty government assisted place. I was the first in my family to be educated at an independent school and the first to go to university, and I have no doubt whatsoever without those courageous choices by my parents over 40 years ago, I would not be writing this message to you now as Foundation Principal.

The end of term is always a showcase for the exceptional activities which have taken places over the preceding weeks, culminating in concerts, shows, sports fixtures, and exhibitions. What our young people achieve is extraordinary - and I would like to thank each and every family, now more than ever, for the support you bring to enable this to happen. Together, we transform the lives of the young people in our care. Thank you.

## KING HENRY VIII SCHOLARSHIPS

Warwick Schools Foundation is proud to announce the launch of the King Henry VIII Scholarships for children living in town of Warwick. The scholarships, which will typically involve a fee discount of up to 50%, are awarded based on outstanding achievement or potential to do so for children living in the CV34 postcode.

The Foundation is partnered by King Henry VIII Endowed Trust and The Charity of Sir Thomas White, Warwick in the delivery of these scholarships and is grateful for their financial support. The scholarships will usually be open to pupils either joining a Foundation school in Year 7 or Year 12, or those moving from one Foundation school to another at these points.

The scholarships aim to recognise those children who demonstrate outstanding achievements or the potential to do so. They can be awarded for academic achievement or all-around achievement more generally.

Alongside the launch of the new scheme, the Foundation's means-tested bursaries are also being extended to younger children for the first time ever. The CV34 bursaries, which could mean up to 100% fee support for families whose household income is below a certain threshold, are now available to families looking at Year 3 entry to the Foundation's schools.

The awarding of the King Henry VIII Scholarships is subject to annual review, and recipients must remain resident in CV34 for the duration of their time in the school to continue to benefit from this award.

To be considered for a scholarship, candidates must apply to the school of their choosing by the earlier scholarship deadline, with dates available on each school's website. Details can be found at [helpwithfees.co.uk/kinghenryviii](http://helpwithfees.co.uk/kinghenryviii).



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
